

Pinewood Safety

SUMMARY

- A BSA Pinewood Derby Safety Minute focuses on key precautions for building and racing, emphasizing
 - adult supervision for power tools (saws, drills),
 - wearing eye/ear protection,
 - maintaining a clean workspace, proper tool handling,
 - dust control (masks),
 - no loose clothing,
 - careful weight management (no melting lead)

GENERAL INFORMATION

Key Safety Points for Pinewood Derby

- **Tool Safety (Adults Only for Power Tools):** Only adults should use band saws, scroll saws, Dremels, etc., wearing safety goggles and ear protection.
- **Workspace Safety:** Keep the area clean, well-lit, and ventilated; use dust masks when sanding.
- **Car Building:** Wear gloves when using sharp tools, avoid loose clothing, and handle weights carefully (no melting lead).
- **Race Day Safety:** Set up barriers (e.g., rope) to keep spectators away from the track, define the pit area, and have weigh-in procedures.
- **General:** Follow the [BSA's Guide to Safe Scouting](#) and the [SAFE Checklist](#).

GENERAL INFORMATION

How to Use a Safety Minute

- **When:** Before a car-building session, a pack meeting, or the actual race.
- **Who:** Any adult or older Scout can deliver it.
- **Content:** Briefly cover 1-2 key safety topics relevant to the activity (e.g., "Today, we're focusing on proper dust mask use when sanding").



Individual Scout Rank Advancement Plan (ISAP)

The approval of alternative rank requirements should be discussed with the Scout, parent or guardian, and unit leader. An agreement is reached and forwarded to the council advancement committee for approval before starting to work on the specific task. The ISAP is the basic plan that can be used for all Scouts to document proposed and approved alternative rank advancement requirements. The ISAP is modified by addendum. Additional information can be found in the Guide to Advancement, section 10.

Statement of belief: Though it is true every Scout must have the overall ability to fulfill advancement requirements as written, members with a documented disability deserve the opportunity to utilize their remaining abilities to fulfill alternative requirements that represent the same challenge and essential outcome as those written. The only limitations for members with sufficient abilities to achieve approved alternative requirements should be their individual desire, focus, and perseverance.

Objective: Scouting literature provides the requirements, policies and procedures, and related supporting content. It cannot address each individual Scout's abilities, but it can help those involved to reach an understanding as to how certain goals can be met. The ISAP is a road map that Scouts, their parents or guardians, mentors, and other leaders can reference and update as necessary.

Methodology: Within reasonable guidelines, the ISAP will provide Scouts with the opportunity to achieve their personal goals and, through creative thinking and action, remove unnecessary barriers that may impede their advancement. This is done so as not to lessen the relative challenges of the Scouting experience and the primary goal of personal growth.

Expectations of performance: Scouts are expected to do their best to the limits of their abilities and resources.

APPLICATION FOR ALTERNATIVE EAGLE SCOUT RANK MERIT BADGES

A youth in Scouts BSA or qualified Venturer or Sea Scout who has a physical or mental disability may achieve the Eagle Scout rank by qualifying for alternative merit badges. This does not apply to individual requirements for merit badges. Merit badges are awarded only when all requirements are met as stated. See the Guide to Advancement, topic 10.1.2.6, for details.

The physical or mental disability must be of a permanent rather than of a temporary nature for a disability expected to last more than two years or beyond the 18th birthday. This request must include a written statement from a qualified health-care professional related to the nature of the disability. This person may be a physician, neurologist, psychiatrist, psychologist, etc., or an educational administrator as appropriate.

Before applying, a Scout must earn as many of the Eagle-required merit badges as possible. However, if a permanent disability clearly precludes completing specific merit badges, a Scout who has earned at least First Class may apply for an alternative merit badge without waiting until all other Eagle-required merit badges are completed. Any alternatives must present the same challenge and learning level as those they replace. Unless the Scout has been approved for registration beyond the age of eligibility, all merit badges must be completed by the 18th birthday reference date in Advancement, topic 10.1.1.5, 10.1.1.6, 10.1.1.7.

1. Obtain a clear and concise statement related to the nature of the disability from a qualified health-care professional.
2. The unit leader meets with the candidate and the candidate's parent or guardian to determine the alternative merit badges to replace those the candidate is unable to complete.
3. The unit leader, parent or guardian, and the Scout (if possible) prepare supporting letters to accompany the application.
4. The district and council advancement committees, in turn, review the proposed alternative merit badges. They may choose to speak with the Scout, the Scout's parent or guardian, or the unit leader. If the council advancement committee approves, then the candidate may start work on the merit badges.

Note: In approving the application, the district and council advancement committees must utilize the expertise of a health-care professional involved with youth who have disabilities.

Upon completion of the Eagle Scout rank requirements, using the alternative merit badges, the candidate appears before a board of review. This approved application must be attached to the Eagle Scout Rank Application.

6. Following a successful board of review, the council processes both applications and forwards them to the National Scouts BSA Advancement Team. Local council action on alternative merit badges does not require national approval.

The Purpose of the Eagle Scout Award
 Recipients of the Eagle Scout Award are youth in Scouts BSA, or qualified Venturer or Sea Scouts, who apply the principles of the Scout Oath and Law in daily life. They have achieved the qualities below with determination and persistence.

- Capacity for leadership and a concern for others
- Ability to help others through skills they have learned
- Ability to live and work cooperatively with others by meeting their responsibilities to the unit
- Concern for self by improving their physical fitness to the limits of their resources




Den Leader Title Migration

- Named den leader positions (i.e. Tiger Cub Den Leader, Webelos Den Leader, Lion Den Leader, Lion Coordinator) will be transitioned to Den Leader. In addition, Assistant Webelos Den Leader will be transitioned to Assistant Den Leader. Leaders with named den leader positions will be given new positions with the same expiration and end dates and should not experience any changes in functionality with their new position.

Family Troop Option

- Starting December 15, 2025, a new "family troop" option will be available that allows a single troop to serve both boys and girls. Tested in successful pilot programs, this model provides greater flexibility for chartered organizations, shared leadership, and opportunities for families to scout together. Most troops will continue to be single-gender, but this new option gives communities an additional option to grow membership and enhance program delivery.

- These updates will take effect on January 1, 2026, so now is the time to familiarize yourself with the changes.
- The Scouts BSA Advancement Committee has made thoughtful updates to over 80 merit badges

Scouts BSA Advancement Updates

- Key Updates Include:
 - **Updated Career Exploration Requirements**
Many merit badges now feature expanded career exploration options that help Scouts research real-world job opportunities, understand education requirements, and explore how Scouting skills connect to future careers or hobbies. These updated requirements encourage Scouts to think about how their interests might shape their future.
 - **Enhanced Safety and Outdoor Ethics**
Several badges now include important discussions about Leave No Trace principles and the Outdoor Code, helping Scouts understand their responsibility to protect natural areas during their adventures.

Scouts BSA Advancement Updates

- **Modernized Content and Skills**

Merit badges have been updated to reflect current technology, safety practices, and knowledge. For example:

- **Radio** now covers cell phones, Wi-Fi, Bluetooth, and RFID technology
- **Digital Technology** includes QR codes and barcodes
- **Safety** expands to cover online safety, safeguarding youth, and travel safety
- **Traffic Safety** addresses distracted driving and modern vehicle safety features

Scouts BSA Advancement Updates

- When Do These Changes Take Effect?
 - All updated requirements officially take effect on **January 1, 2026**. The changes will be reflected in Scoutbook and on our online [Merit Badge Hub](#) by late December 2025.
- What If My Scout Already Started a Merit Badge?
 - According to the [Guide to Advancement](#), Section 7.0.4.3:
 - Scouts who begin working on a merit badge on or after January 1, 2026, must use the new requirements
 - Scouts who started a merit badge before January 1, 2026, may continue using the previous requirements until the badge is completed, OR they may choose to switch to the new requirements






